## Appendix

### Violence definitions:

<b>Domestic violence</b>	All acts of physical, sexual, psychological or economic violence that occur within the family or domestic unit or between former or current spouses or partners, whether or not the perpetrator shares or has shared the same residence as the victim. This term encompasses both intimate partner violence and intergenerational violence.
<b>Intimate partner violence</b>	Refers to behaviour by an intimate partner or ex-partner that causes physical, sexual or psychological harm, including physical aggression, sexual coercion, psychological abuse and controlling behaviours
<b>Femicide</b>	Femicide is generally understood to involve intentional murder of women because they are women, but broader definitions include any killings of women or girls.
<b>Non-partner sexual violence</b>	Any sexual act, attempt to obtain a sexual act, or other act directed against a person's sexuality using coercion, by any person regardless of their relationship to the victim, in any setting, perpetrated by a non-partner. It includes rape, defined as the physically forced or otherwise coerced penetration of the vulva or anus with a penis, other body part or object
<b>Stalking</b>	Intentional conduct of repeatedly engaging in threatening conduct directed at another person. This can occur with or without contact, online or offline and include threats and harassment.
<b>Sexual harassment</b>	Unwanted verbal or non-verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature with the purpose or effect of violating dignity of a person
<b>Cyber violence</b>	Cyberviolence is the use of computer systems to cause, facilitate, or threaten violence against individuals that results in, or is likely to result in, physical, sexual, psychological or economic harm or suffering and may include the exploitation of the individual's circumstances, characteristics or vulnerabilities.
<b>Trafficking</b>	The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person, for the purpose of exploitation.
<b>Child maltreatment – Physical</b>	Physical maltreatment involves a caregiver inflicting physical harm or engaging in actions that create a high risk of harm.
<b>Child maltreatment – Emotional</b>	Emotional abuse is inflicting emotional harm through the use of words or actions. Specific forms include berating a child by yelling or screaming, spurning by belittling the child's abilities and achievements, intimidating and terrorizing with threats, and exploiting or corrupting by encouraging deviant or criminal behaviour. Emotional abuse can also occur when words or actions are omitted or withheld, in essence becoming emotional neglect (e.g. ignoring or rejecting children or isolating them from interaction with other children or adults).
<b>Child maltreatment – Sexual</b>	Any action with a child that is done for the sexual gratification of an adult or significantly older child constitutes sexual abuse. Forms of sexual abuse include intercourse, which is oral, anal, or vaginal penetration; molestation, which is genital contact without intercourse; and forms that do not involve physical contact by the perpetrator, including exposure of the perpetrator's

	genitals, showing sexually explicit material to a child, and forcing a child to participate in a sex act with another child or to participate in the production of sexual material.
<b>Child maltreatment – Neglect</b>	<p>Neglect is the failure to provide for or meet a child’s basic physical, emotional, educational, and medical needs. Neglect differs from abuse in that it usually occurs without intent to harm.</p> <p>Different types of neglect can be defined as</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Physical neglect includes failure to provide adequate food, clothing, shelter, supervision, and protection from potential harm.</li> <li>• Emotional neglect is failure to provide affection or love or other kinds of emotional support.</li> <li>• Educational neglect is failure to enrol a child in school, ensure attendance at school, or provide home schooling</li> <li>• Medical neglect is failure to ensure that a child receives appropriate care or needed treatment for injuries or physical or mental disorders</li> </ul>
<b>Infanticide</b>	The killing of an infant child in their first year of life
<b>Child exploitation</b>	Child exploitation is the act of using a minor child for profit, labour, sexual gratification, or some other personal or financial advantage.
<b>Child trafficking</b>	The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of children, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over a child, for the purpose of exploitation.
<b>Child marriage</b>	Child marriage refers to any formal marriage or informal union between a child under the age of 18 and an adult or another child.
<b>Bullying</b>	There is no legal definition of bullying. But it is usually defined as repeated behaviour which is intended to hurt someone either emotionally or physically and is often aimed at certain people because of their race, religion, gender or sexual orientation or any other aspect such as appearance or disability.
<b>Youth Violence</b>	Youth Violence is the intentional use of physical force or power to threaten or harm others by young people ages 10-24. It typically involves young people hurting peers who are unrelated to them and who they may or may not know well. Youth violence can include fighting, bullying, threats with weapons, and gang-related violence. A young person can be involved with youth violence as a victim, offender, or witness.
